What's at Stake

In 2024, over 771,480 people in the United States experienced homelessness on a single night. Unfortunately, related service networks do not have enough resources to help all people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

Some health issues are more common among people experiencing homelessness. They include the following:

- Mental and substance use disorders, which are found still more often in LGBTQ+ and Black youth experiencing homelessness
- Trauma, adverse childhood experiences, and victimization



Our Solution

The Homeless Response Systems Mapping is a targeted mapping event focusing on identifying and developing community-based responses to homelessness by planning around critical intersections. Working together allows state and local governments, local non-profits, and community organizations to reach essential goals, including the following:

- Stabilizing housing for those at risk of homelessness
- Connecting individuals and families experiencing homelessness with services



Our Model

The Homeless Response Systems Mapping model is designed to help people think about how individuals experience homelessness and move to recovery. The model allows communities to see how individuals interact with homeless services and highlights paths to safe, permanent housing.

The Homeless Response Systems Mapping model highlights four points of intersection. They are prevention/diversion, pathways in, conditions of homelessness, and pathways out. In addition, a variety of wraparound services intersect with each point.
